Oh the joys of technology! The digitisation of communication and knowledge storage and retrieval has been a marvellous innovation, freeing up the need to carry heavy books and files when travelling, but when things go wrong...

This has been my recent experience so that the March *e-Newsletter* is a somewhat reduced document due to a generous dose of technological failure and a dash of human error.

As I wrote in my essay 'A Poetical Science' (in *A Fearsome Engine*, Zena Shapter ed, NBWG 2016), technological innovation might progress at an exponential rate, yet in evolutionary terms *Homo sapiens* operates with the same physiological and anatomical configuration it has done since the mists of time.

Moving from technology to our familiar world of literature and writing... The transition from the Dixson Room to the Gallery Room at the Mitchell Library for our February meeting was a smooth one thanks not only to Library staff but also to SWW members who worked to ensure that all present were satisfied with the arrangement.

At the 8 March meeting Dr Bronwyn Carlson will give the keynote speech on the theme of 'A not so uncommon story: a Conversation of Indigenous Life'. Bronwyn Carlson is an Associate Professor of Indigenous Studies at the University of Wollongong (UOW). Her research focuses on Aboriginal identity and community online, as well as Indigenous help-seeking patterns on social media. She has been recognised by the Academy of Social Sciences in Australia for her outstanding achievements. In 2016 she was nominated as one of UOW's women of impact.

The March meeting will also host the second workshop by Helen Scheuerer, 'The importance of editing and how to DIY', allowing participants to hone work done at the February workshop to perfection. Poet Beverley George will give the guest speaker talk, continuing our commitment to Australian women poets.

The aim of the Society is to promote the work of women writers so supporting the Australian Women Writers Challenge, which was set up to help overcome gender bias in the reviewing of books by Australian women, is a worthy initiative. You can choose to read and review, or read only. The 2017 AWW Challenge will run from 1 January – 31 December 2017 (latest date to sign up is 30 November 2017). WORKSHOP

The Importance of Editing & How To DIY

Helen Scheuerer

You might have finished writing your story, but you haven't reached the end of the road yet! Don't you want to know how to refine your work so it's ready for publication? Never underestimate the importance of editing your own work, even if you'll be working with an editor at a later stage. Run by publisher and editor, Helen Scheuerer, this workshop explores the different types of editing (structural editing, copyediting and proofreading).

The workshop will also delve into how to approach these types of edits yourself, and how to utilise beta readers, as well as the common mistakes writers make in their first drafts, how your chosen genre should affect your edit, and the things you can cut from your writing to sharpen your manuscript.

GUEST SPEAKER

Surprising Synergies: tanka at home and abroad

Beverley George

Originating in Japan in the Heian Era, these diminutive 5 phrase 'short songs' are shared and celebrated in diverse languages around the world. They address those concerns of heart and mind that persist unchanged from culture to culture and from millennium to millennium' (Jane Hirshfield).

Beverley George is the founding editor of *Eucalypt*: a tanka journal, which is currently

celebrating a 19-year milestone as editorship passes now to Julie Thorndyke. A commemorative anthology *A Temple Bell Sounds*, comprising 108 favourite tanka selected from issues 1-21; 2006-2016, was launched at The Children's Bookshop, Beecroft on Saturday, 18 February by celebrated poet and editor from Otsu, Japan, Ms. Kiyoko Ogawa.

KEYNOTE SPEAKER

A not so uncommon story: a Conversation of Indigenous Life

Dr Bronwyn Carlson

Bronwyn Carlson is an Associate Professor of Indigenous Studies at the University of Wollongong (UOW). She completed her PhD in 2012 and her thesis was awarded the prestigious W.E.H. Stanner Award administered by the Australian Institute of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies (AIATSIS) and was published in 2016 by Aboriginal Studies Press.

Bronwyn was the first Indigenous Australian at the University of Wollongong to be awarded an Australian Research Council (ARC) Discovery (Indigenous) grant in 2013 for her research on Aboriginal identity and community online on social media. Bronwyn was awarded a second ARC in 2016 for her research on Indigenous help-seeking on social media. She has been acknowledged by the Academy of Social Sciences in Australia for her outstanding achievements as an Early Career Researcher. In 2016 she was nominated as one of University of Wollongong's women of impact.



 The Competitions are: National Poetry, National Short Story and National Non-Fiction.



