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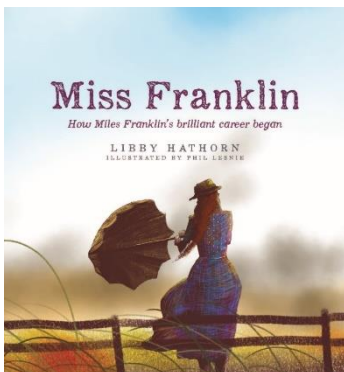
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Part of her writing practice is taking a 'writing retreat', that is, leaving home to write. She will talk about the creative benefit of total devotion to writing away from home.

Preparing your written work for publication. What you can learn today

- How to structurally and copy edit your manuscript (fiction – checking plots, themes, settings, characters, dialogue, protecting your writing style; non fiction – checking chapter orders, structural content, images content and references, online links, indexes and glossaries).
- Why publishers require you to conform to Australian style: includes workshop exercises in editing text in Australian style with examples of common mistakes to avoid.
- How to most efficiently reference the official Australian style guide, *Style Manual for Authors, Editors and Printers* (Wiley), for checking of grammar, punctuation, titles, headings and so on: includes your grammar questions answered from the *Style Manual*.
- Why familiarity with traditional proofreading is the best way to prepare to proofread your manuscript online: includes an introduction to Australian proofreading symbols.

This is a fun and informative workshop that relies on learner input and completion of workshop activities. Workshop notes will be provided for future reference.

Mentoring for writing and editing

A mentor is a supporter of writers but never a dictator.

With quiet encouragement and gentle suggestion, a mentor can assist a writer to complete a poem, short story, novel, play, family history or biography.

A mentor can assist with mental blocks. There are solutions.

A mentor can discuss characters, dialogues, plots, settings and themes.

A mentor can be a sounding wall for a writer to bounce off ideas, sentence structures, chapter sequences, legal and ethical issues.

The corporate or self-publishing processes require manuscripts to be thoroughly edited and then proofread at printing stage.

A mentor can offer an objective view of structural balance and a fresh eye on line (or copy) editing of the text.

A mentor can advise on communications between authors and publishers/printers and discuss changes that may be advised.

A mentor can guide an author through the proofreading stage to final publication.

An effective mentor knows that the final decision must always be the author's decision.


All genres will be considered – fictional, documentary, animation or experimental (e.g. timelapse, hyperlapse and drone), and can be produced on any device including mobile phones.

WILDA AUDREY MOXHAM

11/1/1917 - 10/3/2019

Society of Women Writers President in 1950s, 1970 - 1971 and 1994 – 1996;

Treasurer circa 1955

Wilda had three books published, all with a horse racing background.

The last one, *The Apprentice* was re-printed three times and short-listed for the Miles Franklin Award. Wilda was also a founding committee member of the Australian Society of Authors and Secretary of the Sydney branch of PEN for which she was awarded Life Membership. Hilarie Lindsay tells us that Wilda was an asset to the Society.

Wilda loved committee work from her early days at *The Guardian*. When she was at school, Wilda displayed an aptitude for essay writing so a career in journalism was obvious. She would have loved to attend University but there were never enough funds.

Her Canadian father, Will Leonard, ran the mill in Boonah SE Qld. The owners of that mill also owned the local newspaper, *The Fassifern Guardian*, named after the Fassifern Valley. After completing High School, Wilda took a job at *The Fassifern Guardian*, as a cadet journalist.

Some time after she began as cadet, the Editor left under a cloud and Wilda, at the age of eighteen years, was appointed Editor. She spent time attending meetings of various organisations around town, reporting district doings and Court proceedings. It was a big job because the paper had its own linotype printing press which apart from the paper printed brochures, catalogues etc.

At that time a couple of murders took place when murder was uncommon. The trials became quite prominent with crime reporters arriving from the big papers in Brisbane to report on them. First port of call for the reporters was *The Fassifern Guardian*, to glean background information for the trials. The hard-bitten crime reporters weren't backward in offering pretty Wilda Leonard a lift to the Court House and afterwards helping her with her copy. Wilda enjoyed her time with '*The Guardian*'.

She married in 1939. Her son John was born in 1940, and second son Rod in 1944. Pic Moxham, her husband, was accepted as a volunteer for the American Light Ship Brigade and given the rank of 2nd Lieutenant. He embarked from Sydney on a Dutch cattle boat called the "Schwaatenhort" bound for Milne Bay, New Guinea. Wilda moved to Townsville. After the war, the family settled in Sydney. Wilda began writing in earnest. She wrote short stories that were published in daily newspapers and began writing under contract to publishers for the pulp market. These were classified "Light Romance" and she churned them out monthly for a few years. They sold in newsagents, railway stations etc for the princely sum of 6d and later 8d. They were not high literature, but they demonstrated structure, plot and characterisation

In the early 1950s, Wilda was appointed Publicity and Appeals Officer for NSW Red Cross. After Red Cross, Wilda had a similar position with NSW Crippled Children Society. On her second day on the job, an article appeared on the front page of the *Sydney Morning Herald* detailing the great work of the Society. She knew how to get things done. A major work that remains un-published, *The Top End Affair* embraced uranium mining, a female geologist, cattle stations, Aboriginal people and International big business.

Wilda Moxham will be sadly missed by many. Condolences to the family.
